a diagnosis of the tree. Because the place where the old tree was located was partially included in the building plan, the purpose of the diagnosis was to examine if the tree could be transplanted to another place. However, it was found that the inside of the trunk was rotten and hollow. This meant that the tree would most likely not recover from a transplant, no matter what precautions were taken. The expert concluded that transplanting it with all its roots would be almost impossible.

Then, the next idea was to plant a new tree from the old tree using a grafting technique. In the autumn of the year when the diagnosis was conducted, when one of the two boughs was cut down to prevent collapse of the old tree, twenty branches were collected from the bough for grafting, and transported to a firm in Saitama Prefecture.

In autumn of 2013, this old tree that had provided people with a place of recreation and relaxation for such a long time, had its last day. After an exorcism rite by a Shinto priest in Tenso-jinja Shrine was performed, the old tree was cut down. Shosaku Nirasawa, then Chairman of the Ryudo-cho Neighborhood Association who attended the removal of the tree, looked back and said, "It is really a pity that we had to cut down this beloved tree. The cherry blossoms were more splendid than any other cherry tree around there. However, after one of the

#### How to graft branches

The pruned branch is cut out diagonally and inserted into the rootstock of another tree such as the Oshima Cherry. It is attached with semitransparent tape, etc., for nutrient absorption and drying prevention.

# The Story of the Cherry Blossom in Ryudo-cho

In a green area adjacent to Tenso-jinja Shrine located in Roppongi 7-Chome, there is a thin young cherry tree supported by strips of bamboo. A plate that is set near this tree describes its origin. We took a look at the past and future of this young tree waiting for the coming spring, together with the background of the glassed-in compound building "TRI SEVEN ROPPONGI" and the shrine.

Do you remember that there was an old Yoshino Cherry tree in an alley alongside of the Tenso-jinja Shrine until only a few years ago? This tree of about 70 years old stood inclined with its branches spread at the foot of the steep stairs going to the Seijoki Dori service road (presently Ryudo-cho Bijutsukan-dori Avenue). In the spring, its splendid cherry blossoms were able to be seen in full bloom across the width of the alley, and in the summer it provided people with cool shade with its thick green leaves. Ryudo-cho is the place where the detective, Kogoro Akechi, the main character in the famous detective novel series written by Ranpo Edogawa, has his office. The tasteful charm of the back alley where "old and new coexist" is preserved in the work of Toshitaka Kita (1926 - 2015), a watercolor painter.

About 10 years ago, a redevelopment project was planned for this area. This plan was large in scale, and included the complete renovation of the area. It covered the site and office for the 630-year-old Tenso-jinja Shrine, and the construction of a 14-story compound in the adjacent grounds. When temporary enclosure panels for construction began to be set up around the old tree, people all along the Bijutsukan-dori Avenue raised voices of anxiety regarding the future of the old tree.

Before the start of the construction, in spring of 2011, an expert, as requested by the developer, made

two boughs was cut down, it still produced more beautiful cherry blossoms on the other bough, just as before".

About two years have passed since then. In March last year, the compound that bridges Gaien Higashi-dori Avenue and Bijutsukan-dori Avenue was completed at the site where the alley with the old tree used to be. The area and office of Tenso-jinja Shrine were extensively renovated. In and around the shrine area, a diversity of trees and plants were added, which provide verdure in a small corner of the heart of Tokyo.

The branches collected from the old tree that used to be there were grafted by the firm in Saitama Prefecture, and grew without any problems. Then, two of these branches were planted in the corner of the green area on the shrine grounds. On the display plate set close to the tree, the description of the young tree says, "There used to be an old cherry tree that was loved by many people. However, because it was extremely rotten, it was cut down with reluctance. This young tree has been grown from the branch of the old tree".

It is said that a grafted Yoshino Cherry tree will start flowering within a few years. We can hardly wait until the branches of the old tree bloom again with splendid cherry blossoms.

## **Cherry Tree Trivia**

- Because the Yoshino Cherry tree was cultivated by hand in the Edo period, it cannot be propagated with its seeds. The only way for it to propagate is to graft a branch of Yoshino Cherry tree to the stock of another cherry tree. Yoshino Cherry trees continue to be grown using this grafting method.
- All Yoshino Cherry trees have the same DNA (they are all clones!), so they all burst into bloom at the same temperature. Therefore, it is easy to estimate and forecast the dates the blossoms will appear.
- In Tenso-jinja Shrine in which Fukurokuju (the large-headed god of happiness, wealth and long life) in the Minato Shichifukujin (Seven Deities of Good Fortune) is also enshrined, there is a double flowering cherry tree called "Fukurokuju" of which pale pink cherry blossoms bloom in the middle to end of April.

# "I have been working earnestly for a long time as an architect".

We called on Mr. Edward Suzuki in a quiet residential area in Nishi-azabu, away from the hustle and bustle of Roppongi Avenue. He has been living in the house for about 15 years, and about 8 years ago, he moved his office into the same building. He tells us that every day he appreciates the convenience of central Tokyo, where he can visit his clients' (for architecture and construction) offices on foot and especially the "enjoyment of the great variety of interesting and sometimes unusual choices

available for lunch all within a few minutes walk", because of the location of his office.





His favorite is the roof of his own house: The day the photos were taken was a fine day and Mt. Fuji could be viewed from there

#### -What is the reason that you chose to become an architect?

"Since I was little, I have always liked drawing pictures. Immediately after the War, I sometimes got bullied in my elementary school in Sayama City, Saitama Prefecture, because my face is a bit unusual (my father is German and my mother is Japanese), so I spent days 'having a quarrel outside', 'drawing pictures at home' or 'playing games of make-believe in the woods'. Later, when I had grown up and went to university, I thought, 'even if I major in drawing I would not be able to earn a living in the future'. Then, I decided to choose the nearest field to drawing and tried studying subjects related to architecture. I found it was very interesting for me. In addition to this, I remembered the time when my parents ran a foreign car dealership, and my mother transported used foreign cars from Saitama to the Tokyo Metropolitan area. I was a child and sat in the passenger seat. At that time, I sometimes saw high-class residential areas including Daikanyama, Aoyama and Denen-chofu, etc., from the car window. Around that time, I had a dream 'to become the President of the USA in the future when I grew up' and I designed an imaginary house (presidential mansion) where I would live in my future (laughs)"

## —It was the period of high economic growth in Japan (1960s to 1970s), when you decided to become an architect in earnest.

"Well, I was fascinated and moved by the buildings including the Yoyogi National Stadium, designed by Kenzo Tange, which was built in time for the Tokyo Olympic Games held in 1964. I was also very motivated by Expo '70 in Osaka. Since establishing my own architecture office when I was 29 years old, I have worked earnestly as an architect, regardless of the job types, whether it was a public building or residential building. When I design a house, the relationship with the owner or residents continues even after completion. For example, I designed a condominium only for foreigners in Ikeda-Yama (Shinagawa City) in the past. In this case, I dared to design a small-scale 2-story building and arranged it so the residents would feel the real Japan. Then, I began to receive fan letters from tenants in the building, and I received good information on when it would be reconstructed in the future. In conclusion, I took charge of the design of the new building. Also, before the demolition of

the building, the "Guided Visit before Demolition" was held and about 360 people gathered for it".

#### —Are you particular about typical Japanese materials?

"I have visited Kyoto many times since I was a student, because I love Kyoto very much. I have a lot to learn from the buildings that remain, having endured the weather in Japan for thou-

#### sands of years. When I was young, I tended to aim at formatively 'eye-catching architectural design'. However, now I am interested in something invisible, such as the air, atmosphere, comfort and inner structure of buildings, etc. Generally, buildings in Tokyo tend to be built based on the defensive idea, where the inside is totally enclosed from the outside. On the other hand, my theme is 'Interface'. I would like to ease the tension between outside and inside by preparing the intermediate area. The symbolic existence is an 'Engawa' (traditional Japanese peripheral corridor) that has been utilized by Japanese people as representative of wisdom in everyday life. We should learn from Japanese building design where light and wind can be felt, the idea of using the sky view and natural scenery around the building and traditional assets such as the eaves, paper sliding doors and inner gardens, etc. I believe that we should rely on mechanical energy only when a good design is not possible with natural ventilation and light".

#### -He has left his marks in the Azabu area as an architect.

"I designed a building with 11 floors above ground located close to the Shin-Ichinohashi Crossing just before the collapse of the bubble economy. 'Joule' is the 'unit of energy' in English. The letter 'A' from Azabu was attached to it and the building was named 'Joule A'. The building owner at that time chose this name with the idea that the building would be an inspiring piece of the community's development. A condition of the design was that it should be a eye-catching structure in a corner

"I have been involved in the Reconstruction Project for Nishimachi International School located in Moto-azabu from the beginning. The


condition was that the original classical building designed by William Merrell Vories should remain. Therefore, I decided not to design a new building with a classic image, but dared to select a modern design so that the tension between

When you go up the Torii-zaka slope, the view on the right hand side of the gentle slope is the gracefully designed Toyo Eiwa Jogakuin Main Office/Graduate School Building. When its impressive door is opened, you are welcomed with a big smile from the guard. Everybody can enter the Toyo Eiwa Jogakuin Archives/Hanako Muraoka Library Exhibition Corner on the first

floor of this building. The visiting report is as follows.

School Building designed by William Merrell Vories

Martha J. Cartmell, a lady missionary of the Methodist Church of Canada, established Toyo Eiwa Jogakuin in 1884, which has a long history of over 132 years. In this tasteful building, the original design by William Merrell Vories, very familiar to the neighborhood of Azabu, was reproduced. To be precise, the first building for the high school designed by Vories in 1933, fortunately survived the air raid of the Second World War, but time for rebuild was at last reached in around the 1990s. Responding to the wishes of the graduates that "the design of Vories should remain", the building was rebuilt in 2003.

The exhibition corner on the first floor where we wanted to visit is an intellectually stimulating and sophisticated space. Many valuable historical materials including photographs, books and letters are displayed. This corner was planned based on the suggestion of the Chairman of the board of Trustees and Chancellor of Toyo Eiwa Jogakuin in 2006, who said "There should be a place where we could observe the school's traditions". Since its opening, a special exhibitions are held several times a year in

this corner, together with the permanent exhibition.

#### The corner about Hanako Muraoka should not be missed

There is no question that the highlight is the permanent exhibition corner showing the study of Hanako Muraoka in her later years. Hanako Muraoka was a translator and writer of children's literature, who is well known by NHK's Morning Drama serial "Hanako and Anne" aired in 2014. She is also a graduate of this school and contributed to the school, as a director of the alumnae association, etc. (She appeared in "The Phenomena of Azabu" in "The Azabu Vols. 30 and 31".) In the same year, Hanako's granddaughters, Mie Muraoka and Eri Muraoka donated the total set of Hanako's study. Hanako's collection of books, manuscripts, furniture and her cherished objects in "Anne of Green Gables Memorial Hall/Hanako Muraoka Library" located in her own house in Omori, Ota City were also donated. Especially her autographed manuscripts of an excellent translation of "Anne of Green Gables" are exhibited. Next to it, a signboard for "Michio Bunko Library", photographs and some children's books are exhibited. This library was named after Hana-

ko's first son, who passed away at an early age. It was the first home library in Japan. A part of this library is reproduced here. Hanako

### The Country of Aurora, Moomin and Santa Claus The Limitless Charm of Finland

2017 is a commemorative year for the people of Finland, as they celebrate the centenary of independence from the Russian Empire.

Japan is the first country in Asia to recognize the independence of Finland, and 2019 is the 100th anniversary of Japan-Finland Diplomatic Relations. In the same year, the "Moomin" theme park is scheduled to open in Hanno City, Saitama Prefecture. "Moomin" is a well-known and lovable character emblematic of Finland. There are likely to be more projects and events like this in cooperation with Finland. H.E. Mr. Jukka Siukosaari, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to Japan (hereinafter referred to as "the Ambassador"), was assigned as Ambassador to Japan in September 2016, after postings in Ireland, Italy, South Africa, the United Kingdom and Argentina. He took time from his busy schedule to speak to us.

#### Finland Has a Lot in Common with Japan

The Ambassador came to Japan for the first time for an international conference in 2005. At that time, he was so busy he only went back and forth his hotel and the venue for the conference. The second time he visited Japan was just a preliminary inspection with his family, when he had not yet finished his post as Ambassador to Argentina in Buenos Aires. It was a snowy day in January. All members of his family were actually very pleased with this, because they felt like they were coming home! Japan is the first country in Asia he has been assigned to as a diplomat.

When we asked him about his first impression of Japanese people, his immediate thoughts were that there are many similarities between Japan and Finland.

"There are many people who are somewhat shy or reserved here, and it takes a while to get to know new people. However, once a relationship is established, long friendships and great mutual respect are common to the Japanese and the Finnish people." We all nodded, as we could really appreciate this point. He added that they have an orderly society that functions, and a common characteristic such as following rules, just like the Japanese people.

He pointed out that another remarkable thing we have in common is that they eat raw fish, which is quite rare in Europe. He further added, with a big smile, that most Finns could eat sashimi and sushi without any difficulty.

#### 75% of the Country is Covered in Forest and Lakes Cover 10%

Finland is about 1,000 km long from north to south. 75% of the country is forest and Finns have about 188,000 lakes and ponds (\*1). They maintain a lifestyle of coexistence with nature even in urban areas. They take great care of their towns and cities. Trees

and flowering plants are even planted between buildings, not just in parks. This is also true in Japan. The Ambassador routinely takes a daily walk with his two dogs. The Ambassador has three children and their favorite character is, of course, Moomin. Finns love the Moomins, characters popularized by the Finnish artist Tove Jansson (1914 to 2001). The Ambassador had also read all of Jansson's Moomin books by the time he was 11 years old. He reads the same books to

Children all over the world eagerly anticipate Christmas, and Finland is famous as the country where Santa Claus lives. Finland attracts tourists from around the world for aurora viewing tours. From Japan, about 260,000 people visit Finland per year (\*2). > Ice hockey is very popular in Finland even though it is not a national sport. The number of children who play it is large, comparable to that of football. "However, my son is keen on basketball," he said.

> In Finland, there are many unique competitions and many people come to join such competitions from all over the world. For example, "Swamp Football" is one of them. The venue is set intentionally in a swamp, and participants get very muddy as they play the game. He explained, "Even if you are not able to run fast, or you are not good at football, you can really enjoy this sport." The "Wife Carrying" race is also well known. Husbands run the course with their wives on their backs, which looks more fun than carrying them in their arms.

When we asked him, "Have you ever participated in this event?" he smiled and joked, "No, I haven't, but I carry her at different occasions." That's great!

One championship that he has participated in is called, "Boot Throwing." There is also a "Mobile Phone Throwing Championships". Another competition well known to the Japanese people is the "Air Guitar World Championships." In this competition, participants act as if they are playing a guitar and they compete with their performances. In the past, two Japanese won this contest.

They say that one of the national characteristics of Finns is their shyness. Surprisingly, they also demonstrate the opposite characteristic in these unbelievably unique competitions. "Finns loves rules, so there are strict rules in any competition, which is well understood among Finns." We also understand that well!

#### **A Prominent Country where People Love Coffee and Saunas**

Finland is the world's No. 1 consumer of coffee per capita. We were very surprised to hear this. Statistically, Luxembourg is actually No. 1, partly because the tax rate in Luxembourg is low, so people from the neighboring countries visit to buy large amounts of coffee beans there. Finns drink an average of 3.3 cups of coffee a day, or 1,212 cups a year (30 times more than Japanese: 340 cups a year per Japanese) (\*3). They consume 12 kg of coffee beans (Japan: 3.4 kg) (\*4), which is twice as much as Italians. This figure is based on statistics for the entire population, so consumption per adult must be much higher.

"Robert's Coffee" is famous in Finland, and there is a branch of the shop in Fukuoka also in Japan. In Finland, there are many coffee shops in city streets. Drinking a cup of coffee is part of their daily lives at home and in the office. When a guest comes, a cup of coffee is always served. However, they don't let children drink coffee, just like in Japan. They start drinking coffee when they are around 15 years old. Ambassador started it at 18 years old.

One more interesting comparison is the number of saunas. They say that there are more than 3 million saunas for a population of 5.49 million (\*5). They are considered indispensable to the Finnish lifestyle. Amazingly, the Embassy has saunas for guests and staff members.

Talking with the Ambassador was very interesting, and there seemed to be no end to the topics we could discuss. He told us many stories. Their pride in the coffee and baked sweets they served for us during our interview was wonderful, and very much appreciated.

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

—The Slope where people and their spirits come and go—

# Ochiai-zaka Slope

This time, a slope along the Azabu Gazenbo-cho that was described in the last volume (Ochiai-zaka Slope, Vol. 38) is reintroduced. Various episodes might be hidden there. I expected so, and decided to research it.

#### There was no name for the slope!

The signboard standing on top of the slope says, "It is uncertain when this slope was finally named, or who named it, but in the era when Tokyo was called Edo, this slope had no name". "Oh my gosh! I had at last found a slope with no name!" I said to myself. I gazed at the view from the top of the slope. The name of the slope now is "Sannen-zaka", but in the Edo Period, people might not have recognized this as a slope. Presently, stone stairs have been installed and the road has been paved. (However, in the Edo Period, this road might have just been an inclined bumpy street). There are many slopes that might have had no name in Minato City, but this case is quite interesting because it is unknown when the slope was named, or what the origin of the name is.

Apart from that, the view from the top of the slope is breathtaking. This would be because of the large difference of elevation between Azabu-dai and the valley, but the contrast of old townscape in the valley in the front against the new high-rise buildings in the distance is wonderful. Sannen-zaka slope is quite steep, so now stairs have been installed, which look tasteful together with this breathtaking view. On the left side, we can see the dignified rear view of the Azabu Post Office. On the right side, there is Ark Hills Sengoku-yama Mori Tower, and in front of us, the Tokyo Midtown building rising high in the distance (\* the highest building in the area). It seems to benefit from this rolling landform, and the townscapes of the past and present are beautifully viewed together.

#### In fact, there are many "Sannen-zaka" slopes.

As stated in the signboard previously mentioned, "Sannen-zaka' (three-year slope) is also written as 'Sannen-zaka' (three-sense slope), and there are other slopes with the same name. In fact, there is a slope with the same name close to Shimizu in Kyoto". It is mysterious that there should be various interpretations. However, I had a question: "What did the name 'Sannen-zaka' (three-sense slope) come from?" So I looked into it. It is said "when a person tumbles down to the ground on the slope, the person will die within three years unless the person licks the soil on the slope three times". How frightening is that?! This slope is very steep, so falling down would be quite possible for visitors. According to this saying, we should just lick the soil three times to survive. However, it is unknown when, who, and why the slope was named like this. Because this slope had no name in the Edo Period, the mystery deepens even further. On the signboard, it is concluded, "It would be romantic if a person long ago put their feelings of nostalgia for their hometown of Kyoto in the name of the slope". "Romantic" also seems mysterious, but I hope that the hometown of the person who named this slope was Kyoto. This is of course a popular version, not the real origin of

Because the origin is so mysterious, we can imagine a variety of interesting episodes around it.

#### **Surging New Waves**

In this area where new and old townscapes are viewed together, and even a frightening origin story has been conceived, an unavoidable "New Wave" has arrived. A redevelopment project is coming around the corner. It is natural that the town changes little by little, as people have been living there for a long time. There is only a little time left for viewing such a beautiful contrast of the past and present, but we look to the future of Azabu, which no one has seen yet.


#### **About the Azabu Future Photo Studio?**

#### **SUMITOMO Family and Baron**

It is said that Tomoito SUMITOMO is the person who built the foundation of the modern SUMITOMO group today.

For the SUMITOMO family, the first head Masatomo SUMITOMO was a Buddhist priest, and became a merchant in the 17th century. He provided hints for merchants in his book "Monju-in Shiigaki". His brother-in law Riemon Soga operated a copper-refining factory in Kyoto, and his first son Tomomochi became an adopted son of Masatomo SUMITOMO. Tomomochi established Izumi-ya SUMITOMO as the head house of the "Nanban-fuki" copper-refining technique and established the "well curb" trademark associated with "Izumi" (fountain) from the meaning of "Izumi-ya"

In the history of the SUMITOMO family, since receiving permission to open the Besshi copper mine from the Tokugawa Shogunate in the Edo Period, in exchange for "Unjokin" Edo Period business taxes, they continued to operate this mine as one of the foremost private mines in Japan for 300 years up to the Showa Era. In the national isolation era in Japan, the SUMITOMO family supported Japan as a copper-producing country through international trade through Nagasaki. In the periods of confusion before and after the Meiji Restoration, they maintained their right to manage the copper mine, and after that increased copper production in the Meiji Era under the government policy of encouraging new industry for a prosperous country.

In 1893, the SUMITOMO family accepted Takamaro Tokudaiji from a court noble as an adoptive heir, and as the head of the family. He was a very sophisticated person who studied Japanese classical literature and books written in Chinese when he was in his early childhood, and acquired a court noble's academic traditions and elegance. Then, he studied in the Gakushuin School.

He adopted the name of Kichizaemon Tomoito SUMITOMO and worked hard to develop the family business. He aimed at modernizing the management of the Besshi Copper Mine. and the diversification of the SUMITOMO family businesses. In 1895, he established SUMITOMO Bank Ltd., and built a foundation for the related companies of the next generation such as SUMITOMO Warehouse Co., Ltd., and SUMITOMO Shindo-jo (copper foundry), etc. In 1896, he revised the family constitution. The success of his business is proven in records that show Kichizaemon SUMITOMO was at the top of the list of millionaires in Osaka Prefecture with 70 million yen in 1916.

On the other hand, Tomoito SUMITOMO asked Koun Takamura (1852 to 1934), a professor at the Tokyo School of Fine Arts and others to create a statue of Masashige Kusunoki (a military commander in the 14th century) to mark the 200th anniversary of the Besshi Copper Mine in 1980. Tomoito donated it to Japan in 1900. This statue still exists in Kokyo Gaien, the Outer Garden of the Imperial Palace, National Garden. In 1904, He donated the Osaka Library to Osaka Prefecture.

In 1911, Kichizaemon Tomoito SUMITOMO was given the title of baron.

#### A Short History of the SUMITOMO Family's Second House in Azabu Ichibei-cho

One of the episodes related to the relationship between the SUMITOMO family and Azabu is that they purchased land of about 3,400 tsubos (11,220m2) in 1-113, Azabu Ichibeicho (presently 1-5-1, Roppongi) previously owned by Marquis Nakahiro Ikeda, in 1912. A German traditional-style brick main house and attached Western-style house and Japanese-style house were designed by Yutaka Hidaka (1875 to 1952), a graduate from Tokyo Imperial University and a staff member of the Building and Repairs Section at the SUMI-TOMO Head Office. This was completed in 1916, and called the Azabu Ichibei-cho Second House.

On September 1, 1923, when the Great Kanto Earthquake occurred, the Azabu Second House sustained only slight damage such as to roofing tiles and walls. In the main building, families of the company's staff whose houses were more seriously damaged were

accepted, and a temporary building was constructed in the site to offer shelter. On September 5, 1923, 111 tons of rice and 1000 blankets, etc. were sent from the Kansai region by ship. Part of this was put into the hands of the temporary disaster relief office to help others also at risk for

After the February 26 Incident in 1936, Kinmochi Saionji (1849 to 1940), Tomoito's elder brother by blood, immediately visited the palace, and stayed at the Azabu Second House. On March 6, 1936 he recommended the inauguration of the Koki Hirota (1879 to 1948) Cabinet. He maintains that on March 8, 1936 the song of a bush warbler in the garden gave him inspiration, such that his work was successfully done, and he went home.

A detached house designed by Eikichi Hasebe (1885 to 1960), an architect and former staff member of the SUMITOMO Building and Repairs Section, was built on the site of the Second House in 1940.

In the middle of the night on March 9, 1945, a fire broke out in the Ichibai-cho Dori area because of the Great Tokyo Air Raid just before the end of WWII. Kafu Nagai's (1879 to 1959) house "Henki Kan" burnt down in the blaze. The SUMITOMO Second House survived, and Kafu accepted the offer to establish the Neighborhood Association Office in the SUMITOMO Second House site. In his diary "Dancho Tei Nichijo", he wrote that in this place, postal matters were accepted and monetary gifts from volunteers in the town were offered to those suffering during those hard times.

SUMITOMO-Kaikan Hall was constructed in 1965 and Sen-oku Hakuko Kan Museum (Tokyo) was built in one corner of Izumi Garden in the redevelopment project conducted by SUMITOMO Realty and Development Co. Ltd., in 2002.

#### The Cultivated Taste of Shunsui

Shunsui (Tomoito) SUMITOMO had many hobbies, such as Tenkoku (seal-engraving), as well as the arts of the sencha tea ceremony and the matcha tea ceremony, Noh stage art and calligraphy since his early childhood, and loved old bronzes and bonsais (dwarf pot-

Shunsui's pursuit of beauty would begin based on his own "taste", but also on Westernstyle housing architecture and culture. He learned about Western art and interior and exterior garden and house design (they decorate the house and garden with art objects) when he travelled to Europe and the United States in 1987. What he learned is evident in the Western-style SUMITOMO houses in Kansai and Azabu.

The first oil painting that Shunsui purchased was "Chousho" (Morning toilette), painted by Seiki Kuroda (1866 to 1924) through an introduction by Kinmochi Saionji. Later, he purchased some more works by Kuroda, but most of them were lost or damaged in the war, as was the SUMITOMO Suma House where such works were displayed. In 1897, he purchased Claude Monet's "Parc Monceau" and "Road to the Saint-Simeon Farm", and other Western-style paintings from Tadamasa Hayashi (1853 to 1906), an art dealer in Paris. Also, he supported Takeshiro Kanokogi (1874 to 1941), an oil painter, for his study in Paris and also supported Chu Asai (1856 to 1907) who came back from Paris and became a professor of Kyoto College of Technology, for the construction of the school buildings of Kansai Bijutsuin (Fine Arts Academy of Western Japan) when he established the new Kansai Bijutsuin. Shunsui also purchased their works. In addition, he purchased French and Japanese oil paintings and collected the works of the artists of the same period, including the ceramic art of Hazan Itaya.

In the introduction to his illustrated old Chinese bronzes book, Shunsui SUMITOMO wrote that "I collected old Chinese bronzes which were not appraised by any expert, but suited my taste and my judgment based on various books I studied". In "Shunju Sashiden" (Zuo Zhuan), a Chinese history book reportedly written by Confucius, which he probably read in his early childhood, it was said "the character of a man is judged based on his refinedness, and a product of culture or civilization should be judged based on its dignity".

We imagine that Shunsui understood products of culture or civilization as an expression of the noble character of a man and collected a wide range of art objects from bronzes and ceramics to Oriental-style and Western-style paintings, according to his own cultivated taste

The cultivated taste of Shunsui exceeds the domain of a private hobby, but contributes to the support of cultural assets for posterity.








- Choose to walk in the shade. Choose to be in cool places. Take a rest as necessary.

How to apply Step 1: Check that you understand the purport and contents of the Charter by looking at the Minato City Official Website.

> Step 2: Obtain a Letter of Agreement from the Collaboration Project Section, Azabu Regional City Office, or from the Minato City Official Website.

> Step 3: Fill in the required information on the Letter of Agreement and either send it by post or submit it in person to the counter at the Collaboration Project Section, Azabu Regional City Office.

The names of shops/business enterprises that support the charter will be posted on the Minato City website and published in community newsletters as "Businesses that are in Agreement with the Spirit of the Charter"

\* An application form for certification as a "Supporting/Recommended Business" will be sent to "Businesses that are in Agreement with the Spirit of the Charter". The application is screened, and shops/businesses that are granted certification are presented with a certificate and certification sticker. In addition, their name and details of their activities will be posted on the Minato City website and published in community newsletters.
