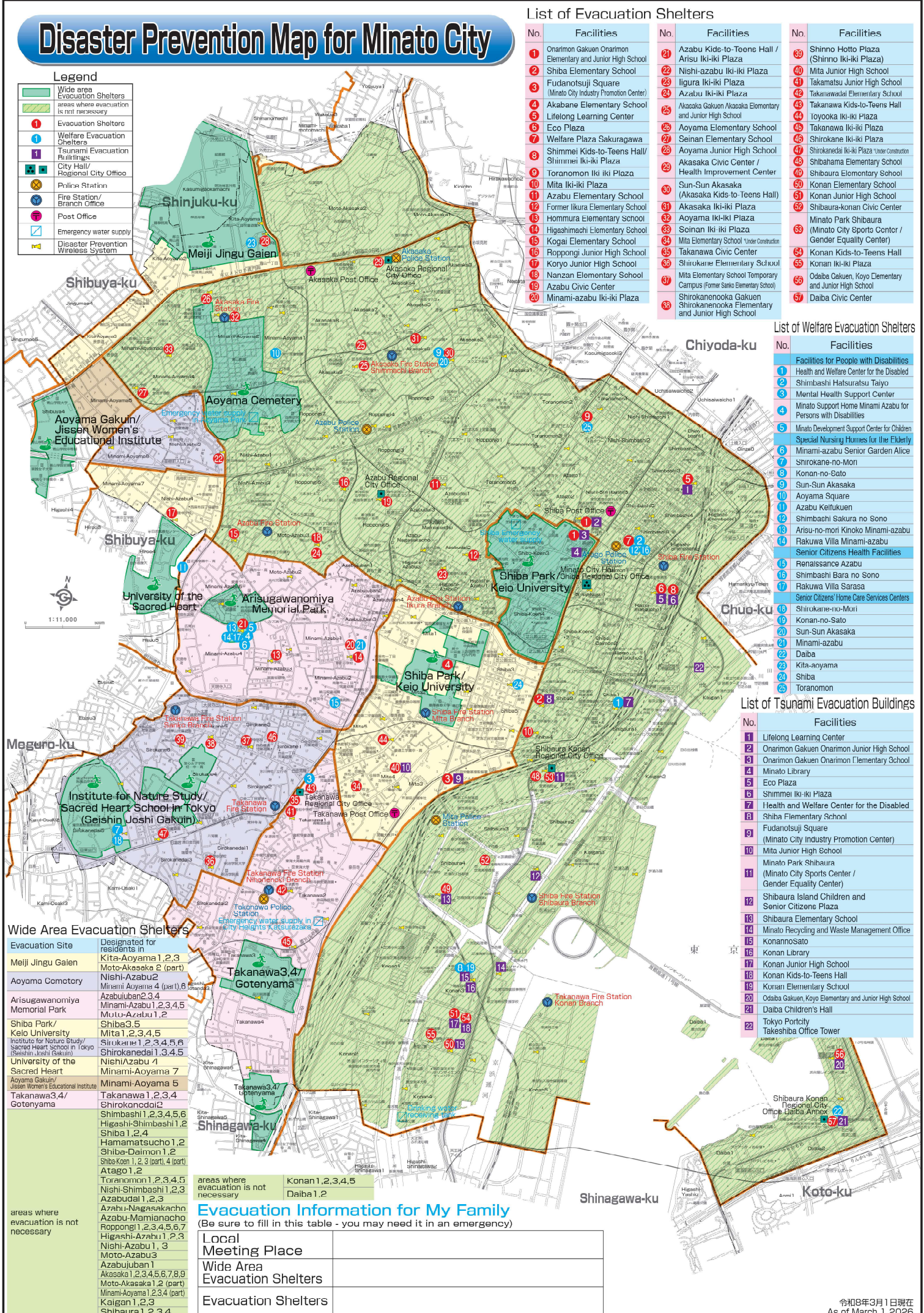


Disaster Prevention Map for Minato City

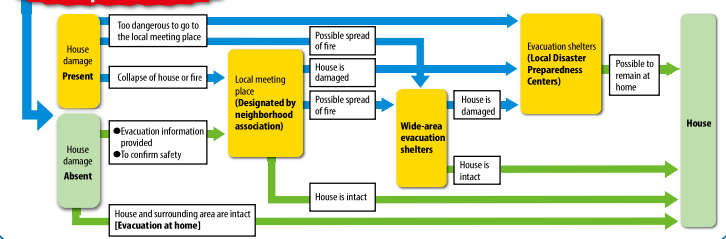

What roles do the different evacuation shelters (evacuation areas) have?

During a disaster, sheltering at home is the basic expectation unless your home becomes uninhabitable due to building collapse, fire, or other damage after a major earthquake. At each evacuation shelter (evacuation site), act voluntarily and cooperate with others.

Local Meeting Place

This is a place where neighbors temporarily gather to confirm one another's safety and receive first aid before going to an Wide area evacuation shelter. An area is established for each neighborhood association. Residents of high-rise building should gather on their own floor or a nearby floor for safety confirmation.

Wide area evacuation shelter

This is a place for temporary evacuation as a precaution against the danger of spreading fire after an earthquake. Residents will return home once the danger has passed if their homes are undamaged. Residents who can no longer live at home due to damage will go to a residents' evacuation site.

High-rise housing

Earthquake occurs



High-rise housing is excellent in terms of earthquake resistance and fire resistance, and there is little fear that these buildings will collapse. First of all, stay calm and confirm that you are safe, confirm safety on each floor and nearby stories, and then stay in your home.

Evacuation Shelters

This is a temporary living space for people whose homes have been damaged in a disaster-related collapse or fire. Residents return to their homes once repairs are completed and they can resume their lives there. Evacuation centers also serve as centers for providing supplies to not only evacuees but also people continuing to live at home and for disseminating information.

Welfare-related evacuation shelter

A temporary place to live for elderly and people with special needs who require nursing or other services and who therefore find it difficult to live in an Evacuation Shelter.

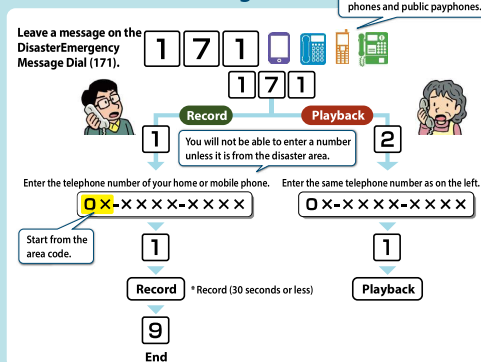
Areas where evacuation is not necessary

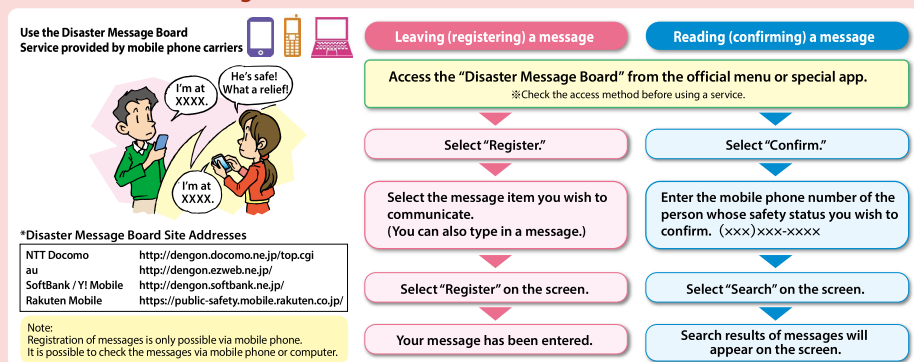

Minato City Disaster Prevention Portal Site

This site provides emergency information, evacuation updates, and the status of shelter openings during disasters. Other features include:

- 1 Checking earthquake, typhoon, and other weather information
- 2 An interactive disaster prevention map with multiple layers of information
- 3 Checking available evacuation shelters and routes to them
- 4 Links to sites providing public transportation status and lifeline infrastructure updates



Use the Hazard Maps

To minimize damage from major earthquakes and heavy rains, etc., the city has created six types of hazard maps based on scenarios of disasters that could cause the worst damage to residents, such as severe earthquakes or extreme rainfall exceeding the drainage capacity of sewers and rivers.

Disaster prevention in the home

When disaster strikes, it is important to protect yourself.

Avoiding injury in your home

- Roughly 30 to 50% of injuries resulting from an earthquake's motion are caused by falling or tipping furniture.
- To reduce the chance of injury in your home during an earthquake, take a fresh look at your living space. For example, see if your furniture is firmly fixed in place and reexamine its installation and arrangement.
- Minato City provides fixtures to prevent furniture tipping free of charge to households in the city.

Be prepared

Prepare at least three days' worth of supplies, and ideally more. In particular, during an earthquake disaster, damage to drainage pipes may render toilets unusable. Be sure to prepare portable toilets and other emergency toilet options.

Stay prepared with "self-protection" always in mind so that you can continue living safely in your own home even after disaster strikes.

The ward's emergency supplies mediation program offers a variety of emergency supplies such as fixtures to prevent furniture from overturning, glass shatterproof film, or portable toilets, below their regular prices.



Do Not Flush Toilets Immediately After a Disaster!

After a disaster, do not flush water toilets until the safety of water supply, drainage pipes, and sewage treatment facilities is confirmed. In past disasters, residents in upper floors unknowingly flushed their toilets, causing sewage to back up and overflow into lower floors due to damaged drainage pipes, resulting in severe damage. In such cases, use temporary emergency toilets or portable toilets instead of flushing. In addition, since it may take several days to restore facilities, stock up on sufficient emergency toilet supplies.



For Those Working or Studying in Minato City

If a major earthquake occurs while you are at work or outside, and public transportation is halted, you may become a stranded commuter unable to return home on foot.

Stranded commuters should stay at their workplace or school to avoid mass movements that could cause chaos. If returning to work or school is difficult or if you have nowhere to go, seek refuge in a temporary stay facility. You can check the list of temporary stay facilities on the Minato City Disaster Prevention Portal Site. Additionally, yellow posters, shown on the right, are displayed at stations and temporary stay facilities.
