Let's Play at Nursery Schools!

Let's Play at Nursery Schools events are held by public nursery schools and licensed children's gardens in order to support local families with children. They are held for children who have not yet entered nursery schools or licensed children's gardens and their parents/guardians. For about one hour in the morning, participants can play together with nursery school teachers and nursery school children, and try out nursery school lunches. Parents can also receive information and individual counseling on childcare from nursery school staff. Some nursery schools even open their playgrounds to the general public. Childrearing Hiroba are open to children that live in Minato City up to about 3 years old, and their parents/guardians. They are places where you can meet other parents/guardians who live nearby, make friends, and socialize. They also host fun events. Some of them also provide temporary childcare.

Child-rearing coordinators listen to any concerns or worries you may have about childcare, and help you look up information about these concerns. If necessary, they will also connect you to relevant professional institutions, administrative services, etc. They also interact with people who visit the Childrearing Hiroba. Child-rearing coordinators have experience with childcare and can offer a wealth of knowledge. We encourage you to speak with them. They also provide consultation over the phone.

Children's Halls, Kids-to-Teens Halls, and the Children and Senior Citizens Plaza have playrooms, meeting rooms, reading rooms, crafts rooms, and rooftop areas where infants and their parents/guardians, as well as elementary, junior high, and high school students can enjoy unstructured play.

They also have balls for play, pools (only in summer), ride-on cars, wooden blocks, kitchen and food toys, picture books, and more for infants. Some parents/guardians bring lunches with them when they bring their infants to these facilities. Make sure to follow the rules, and have fun.

There are four Children's Halls, six Kids-to-Teens Halls, and one Children and Senior Citizens Plaza in the City, and each of them hosts various events for infants and their parents/guardians.

Contact your local Children's Hall, Kids-to-Teens Hall, and/or the Children and Senior Citizens Plaza if you want to make friends or you want to exchange information about childcare.

O Children's Play Groups

Children's Halls, Kids-to-Teens Halls, and the Children and Senior Citizens Plaza all hold events where parents/guardians with infants can get together and enjoy some playtime. About once or twice a week, for about an hour in the morning, they offer fun activities, including parent-child exercises, picture-drawing, paper picture story plays, and seasonal events. Infants as young as 0 years old can participate, with some facilities carefully dividing infants up into groups based on age. All of the facilities require registration. Some of them, however, do not have a maximum capacity or a registration deadline. Contact the relevant Children's Hall, Kids-to-Teens Hall, and/or the Children and Senior Citizens Plaza for details, including registration deadlines.

Children's Halls

Facilities that offer spaces where infants, their parents/guardians, and elementary school students can play, complete with toys.

Hours: Mon – Fri: 10:00 AM - 6:00 PM Sat: 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM

Closed: Sundays, national holidays, New Year's holiday (December 29 - January 3)

Kids-to-Teens Halls

A facility that offers spaces where infants, their parents/guardians, and elementary school students can play, complete with toys, as well as studios, gymnasiums, etc., where junior high/high school students can engage in independent activities they are interested in.

Hours: Every day: 9:30 AM - 8:00 PM (Elementary schoolers are permitted until 6:00 PM

Closed: National holidays, New Year's holiday (December 29 - January 3)

Note that on December 29th and 30th, all Kids-to-Teens Halls (excluding Takanawa) are open to the general public. Opening times differ by facility.

Children and Senior Citizens Plaza

A facility that offers spaces that children and senior citizens can use together, interacting with one another across the generational divide (playing traditional Japanese games, etc.).

Futagonokai (Twins Club)

Shiba no le

Shiba no le, which is run jointly by Keio University and the Shiba Regional City Office, is a project that aims to bring back some of the warmth and connection between people that existed in the Showa Era (mid 1920s - late 1980s), including neighborhood watches and everyday small talk amongst neighbors.

It exists as a social space for anybody in the region, from babies to senior citizens, to just stop by. Drink tea, eat lunch

together, play with toys, enjoy handicrafts, chit chat, read books, play games, do work, and more. Shiba no le is a relaxed space to meet and interact with people.

The Takanawa Hotto Hitoiki Child-Rearing Support Program hosts child-rearing counseling services, lectures, social events, etc., for infants and parents/guardians residing in the Takanawa area. The program was updated in 2021.

Why is the program nicknamed COCO?

"CO is a prefix meaning "with," or "together." The nickname COCO came about as a way of expressing the program's aim of supporting childcare by connecting children ("kodomo," or in this case ""codomo"") with other children, as well as connecting parent/guardians with each other.

Shibaura Konan District Childcare Relief Project

Project teams that include public health nurses, midwives, registered dieticians, and clinical psychologists provide individual consultations for any concerns related to childcare, conduct infant physical assessments, and provide consultations for expectant mothers in Residents' Collaboration Spaces, etc. in the Shibaura Konan District. This is a relaxed space where you can get advice about childcare and make friends. Tanpopo Club

Tanpopo Club, a childcare support program run by the Council for Welfare Workers and Welfare Workers for Children, is a program where infants aged 0-4 years old and their parents/guardians can play freely together and make friends. The program places particular emphasis on helping parents/guardians exchange information about childcare and make friends with each other.

Feel free to talk to the welfare workers/welfare workers for children about any concerns you have regarding childcare. Welfare workers and welfare workers for children are required to maintain confidentiality. They will also introduce you to relevant institutions if necessary.

Minato City Libraries

Throughout the year, public libraries in Minato City hold children's events such as picture book story time (Ohanashi Club), children's movie events, and arts and crafts. Please feel free to participate!

Since Minato City has a large number of foreign residents, we also have a wide selection of foreign-language picture books and foreign-language libraries for children. Also, the branch of the Takanawa Library has a library especially for elementary and junior high school students. This library mainly features books for children and young adults.

All libraries are within walking distance of subway and railway stations, so be sure to come visit with your child.

Library cards can be made by anyone, even babies. Why don't you take time to enjoy reading and talking with your children?

Minato City Local History Museum

The Local History Museum displays exhibits that introduce the history and culture of the City. Visitors can actually touch the earthenware and folk handcrafts as well as view real materials such as Ukiyoe at the communication room that can be accessed for free. There are also exhibits that use imaging devices such as touch panels. The museum also hosts classes for children, including parent-child study sessions and summer break study sessions.

Asobi-no-Kichi

A playground where pre-elementary school children (0-5 years old) and their parents/guardians can engage in safe, unstructured play, while interacting with nature. Chii Bus - Minato City Community Bus

The City began operating the Chii Bus, the Minato City community bus, in October 2004.

Currently, the bus has eight routes: the Tamachi Route, the Akasaka Route, the Shiba Route, the Azabu East Route, the Azabu West Route, the Aoyama Route, the Takanawa Route, and the Shibaura Konan Route.

Fare:

One trip: 100 yen for everybody elementary school age or older

*The bus is free to use for pre-elementary school children.

% If you transfer onto another bus route, you will need to pay 100 yen for each route.

%If you have a Minato City Community Bus Pass, you can show it to the driver to ride the bus for free.

* You cannot use the Seniors' Bus Discount Card (Silver Pass) to ride this bus.



About the Chii Bus Nickname and Logo The nickname "Chii Bus" and the logo were established after a public appeal for ideas.

The nickname comes from the Japanese words for "small bus" ("chiisai bus") and "local" ("chiiki"). For inquiries regarding lost items, bus operations, etc.

Odaiba Rainbow Bus Daiba Shuttle Bus

The Odaiba Rainbow Bus began operations in April 2012 in order to improve access to the Daiba area, which is one of the city's top tourist areas. The bus routes begin and end at the Shinagawa Station Konan Exit bus stop and go around the Daiba area. There are two bus routes: one that goes through the Tamachi Station East Exit, and another that goes through Shibaura 3-chome (Tamachi Station Entrance).

Fare:

One trip: Adults (junior high school student or older): 220 yen Children (elementary school students): 110 yen

**The bus is free to use for pre-elementary school children.
**If you have a Minato City Community Bus Pass, you can show it to the driver to ride the bus for free.

* You cannot use the Seniors' Bus Discount Card (Silver Pass) to ride this bus.

Joint One-Day Pass (Chii Bus/Odaiba Rainbow Bus): 500 yen (sold on buses)

You can use this pass to ride on all Chii Bus and Odaiba Rainbow Bus routes. *Limited to weekends, national holidays, August 13-15, and December 29 - January 3

One-Day Pass (Odaiba Rainbow Bus): 500 yen (sold on buses)

You can use this pass to ride on all Odaiba Rainbow Bus routes. * Sold year-round.
