

# Barrier-free street walking MAP in Minato City

## Course Information

<b>A</b> Shiba Course	A historic sightseeing course where you can feel the Edo period
<b>B</b> Shimbashi Course	A course that goes around the areas where the Japanese railway originated
<b>C</b> Azabu Course	A course of historical and traditional Azabu sights
<b>D</b> Roppongi Course	A course where you can experience the arts
<b>E</b> Akasaka Course	A course where you can explore the charms of Akasaka, interwoven with the traditional and the contemporary
<b>F</b> Aoyama Course	A course for experiencing the culture and arts of Aoyama
<b>G</b> Gaien Course	A course that touches on the history of Meiji period
<b>H</b> Takanawa Course	A course that goes around key areas of Takanawa's history, and an aquarium
<b>I</b> Shirokane Course	A course for seeking out relaxation in a rich natural environment, and for nurturing one's sensitivity at Platinum Street
<b>J</b> Konan Course	A course offering enjoyment along the canal waters as well as nature
<b>K</b> Shibaura & Daiba Course	A course that allows you to feel the sea breeze at Odaiba Marine Park and visit interesting spots in the bay area
<b>L</b> Takeshiba Course	Sweeping views of Tokyo Bay: Enjoy the sea breeze, along with the latest that Minato City has to offer
<b>M</b> Arisugawa-no-miya Memorial Park Course	Cherry blossoms, fresh greenery, ginkgo, and even illumination in winter! The Moto-Azabu area walking course lets you enjoy the scenery to the fullest, no matter the season when you visit
<b>N</b> Mita Course	There are libraries, stores, and places to relax along the canal. There is a lot to do on this course while you enjoy the scenery
<b>O</b> Kamiyacho Area Course	A course to take your time and enjoy the history and art of Azabudai Hills, a landmark of the city

## How to use the map

Filled with helpful information for the elderly and those with children, such as elevators and baby-friendly facilities

This map introduces 15 standard courses connecting popular tourist spots in Minato City. We conducted field tests using a wheelchair when we created this map. In addition to sightseeing and barrier-free information for each facility, we provide actual photographs of barrier-free information on travel routes and points of travel, and display them in an easy-to-understand manner. Please note that the time required for each course and travel time will vary depending on the physical condition, health, and the standard of the wheelchair (such as whether it is manual or electric) of the person going on the tour, so please use this information as a guide only. Additionally, each course may require a caregiver as there are some places where it is difficult for the wheelchair user to move or brake on their own (this map was created based on the assumption that a caregiver will accompany the wheelchair user). The map suggests just one example of a route for the course, so please feel free to change the course according to your mood or the season.

## How to interpret the data

### A-4 Tokyo Tower

Japan's foremost tourist attraction

The soaring, 333 m tall symbol of Tokyo. This radio tower, with its observation deck, was completed in 1958. Tower lights change depending on the season, with cool lights in summer and warm motifs in winter.

POINT! There is a steep uphill in front of Tokyo tower. We recommend that you be accompanied by a caregiver.

Duration 60 minutes

Moving route (walking, wheelchair)

While the slope path is gentle, some sections have a gradient of more than 3°.

3° slope- A slope that is difficult to self-propel unless the wheelchair user is very experienced, and which places a heavy burden on the helper.

3° slope- A slope that is easy to self-propel even for inexperienced wheelchair users, and which make light work for helpers.

3° slope- For example, a slope that rises about 50cm over a distance of 10m.
