



Children can naturally acquire various movement skills through a variety of physical play and activities. Create opportunities for your child to experience the enjoyment of playing through physical movement.


Basic movements







Engage in plenty of physical play with children to help them learn flexibility and how

Let's learn about traditional Japanese events through seasonal craftwork

Many preschools place importance on traditional seasonal events in order to help children understand the meaning and hopes incorporated into the events, and to give them rich experiences by introducing these events in play to feel the changes in the seasons.

Making crafts for each event is one of the ways children can have fun. Teachers come up with ways for the children to enjoy making crafts appropriate for the stages of their development. Various efforts are made at each preschool, and the following are examples of materials and techniques used for each age group according to the children's development.

We recommend that you display what your child brings back from preschool or play with it together at home, so he/she can experience the traditional event and get a sense of the seasons.



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May Tango no Sekku (Boys' Day)

3-year-olds



- The teachers introduce techniques and materials with which the children can make paper carp streamers easily and quickly, so they will feel motivated

to make the craft repeatedly.

 The size of a carp streamer corresponds to the size of the children's hands. They make a stick by rolling a flyer and attach the streamers to this stick, so they can play with it and hold it in their hands.

4-year-olds





5-year-olds



- The teachers place importance on communication between the children, letting them discuss and cooperate with each other to make carp streamers as a collaborative project. In the process of forming a united idea with a few

friends, the children learn to consider and accept the opinions of others.

- The children feel the joy of completing the craft while cooperating with friends.



∘Trivia of Tango no Sekku

Tango no Sekku is an age-old celebration of putting up carp streamers and displaying samurai warrior helmets and figurines, in hopes for children's healthy growth. In some areas, people also take a hot bath with iris leaves and eat chimaki (rice dumpling wrapped in bamboo leaves) and kashiwamochi (mochi wrapped in oak leaves). "There are various theories."

3-year-olds

- The teachers provide materials for the children to choose from to make a craft in their favorite color, so they will have fun and feel motivated to make the craft repeatedly.



 The teachers introduce crafts that are easy to make using glue, such as a paper circle garland or an origami watermelon.

4-year-olds

- The teachers have the children make a paper triangle or square garland and paper chains, so they can enjoy making these long decorations.
- The teachers also
 have the children
 work on making crafts
 of Orihime (Vega) and

Hikoboshi (Altair), to teach them the origin of the Tanabata Festival. The teachers provide the materials which the children modify by cutting and pasting to complete the crafts.



- The teachers give the children an opportunity to attempt more difficult techniques, such as making small cuts with scissors, to make more complex crafts such as shellfish paper chains, diamond chains, and the Milky Way.
- There are many kinds of decorations, so the teachers first show them which decoration they will work on to let them have an idea of what they are going to make.





∘Trivia of the Tanabata Festival

It is believed that you will have good handwriting if you rub the dew of taro leaves onto an inkstick on the day of Tanabata. That is why we have the custom of writing wishes on paper slips at the Tanabata Factival

The paper slips used are usually red, blue (green), yellow, white, and black (purple). Streamers and threads are also often decorated to represent the weaving yarns of Orihime.



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February Setsubun (the Bean-Throwing Festival)

3-year-olds

- The teachers show the children how to hold a crayon firmly and color the mask properly.
- The teachers introduce crafts that are easy to make, and which the children can put on right after they finish making them, so that children can experience the joy of creating the crafts by themselves on the spot.



It is fun to make a box to put beans in (a sampo box). Make one with your child at home.



4-year-olds

- The teachers have the children come up with the facial expression of an ogre and draw or paste the facial parts accordingly.
- The teachers help the children cut the paper along the lines of a circle and other shapes with scissors.
- The teachers help the children apply an appropriate amount of glue on the corresponding area of the paper, so the parts do not peel off.
- The teachers give the children an opportunity to use materials other than paper.





5-year-olds

- The teachers provide paint, wool yarn, thick board paper, etc., so the children can make the ogre mask more realistic.
- The teachers respect the way the children concentrate their efforts in making the mask using a paper bag or papier-mâché.
- The teachers may have the children brainstorm with a few friends to make the craft of an ogre together.



∘Trivia of Setsubun

Setsubun literally means "seasonal division." It used to refer to the day before the beginning of each season in olden times, but it now specifically refers to February 3rd, the day before Risshun (the first day of spring). It was believed that ogres bringing harm to people would appear at the changing of seasons. In order to drive away such evil spirits and welcome the new spring, Setsubun is only celebrated in spring nowadays.



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March Momo no Sekku (the Doll's Festival)

3-year-olds

- -The teachers encourage the children to fold paper by themselves by preparing samples with simple folding techniques while teaching them so they can try on their own.
- The teachers show the children how to bring the two ends of the paper together.
- The teachers prepare long narrow strips of paper, and have the children cut them with scissors. The children then paste these pieces of paper to the board with glue, so they can experience the enjoyment of creating things by themselves.

4-year-olds

- The teachers have the children make crafts using familiar materials, so they can enjoy combining different materials to make crafts.
- The teachers motivate the children to be creative by having them try more difficult techniques, such as cutting a three-dimensional object like a paper cup.





5-year-olds

- The teachers respect the way the children make crafts by themselves using different materials with the techniques they have learned.
- The teachers help the children bring their crafts to completion as they imagined, so they feel a sense of satisfaction and accomplishment.
- The teachers have the children look at their classmates' work, and recognize parts that have been carefully done or worked hard on.







∘Trivia of Momo no Sekku

It is said that Momo no Sekku is a day to wish for healthy growth and happiness for girls. Families display dolls as substitutes for their girls in hopes of protecting them from evil.

It is also believed that peach blossoms have the power to ward off evil spirits and to grant longevity to people. This is why people began to display peach blossoms on Momo no Sekku.

How to choose a picture book

- Books enrich your mind -

When adults offer to read a picture book to children, they may wonder why children turn the pages at their own pace, do not pay attention until the end of the story, or always pick the same book.

Some of you might not be sure of the kind of picture books you should pick for your child.

Here, we introduce how to choose books according to the child's age.

3-vear-olds

Children 3 years of age like picture books with clear and colorful pictures and books with rhythmic repetition of words. When they find their favorite books, they will keep asking you to read them over and over again.

We recommend that you read your child his/her favorite book as many times as he/she wishes.

4-year-olds ····

Children 4 years of age have greater curiosity towards a wide range of subjects since they have learnt the fun of playing with friends and experienced struggles and frustration through fights with friends. They enjoy stories with topics that are familiar to them, such as doing laundry and taking a bath. Picture books with themes about something they experienced at preschool, such as a birthday party and a sports meet, are also good.

5-vear-olds

Children 5 years of age are beginning to develop compassion and have the motivation to solve problems. They imagine the feelings of the characters in the book and excitedly enter the world of the story, identifying with the main character and thinking, "What is going to happen next?"

[We hope you will make good use of the libraries in Minato City.]

Books that are relevant to the seasons and recommendations are on display in the picture book/children's book section at our libraries. The library staff can also give you some advice on how to choose books and how to read them to your child, etc. It is fine to start with books with titles and pictures that catch your child's attention at preschool, the library, or a bookstore.

How to keep insects at home as pets

- Let's keep a snail -

On the way to preschool, you may have many chances to interact with nature. Your child may find ants, pill bugs and cicada shells, for example, If he/she finds a snail, you can keep it at home.

What to prepare

- A pet container ... A case or a transparent container for the
- Small branches and fallen leaves

Feed

- Feed the snail with vegetables such as cabbage and carrot.
- Observe it to find out what it eats besides cabbage and
- Eggshells provide good nutrients for its shell.
- * Soft green leaves are good for a baby snail.

How to care for your snail

- Put the container in the shade in a well-ventilated area.
- Keep the inside of the container moist. (Water it frequently using a mist-spray.)
- Remove the leftover feed and the feces to keep the inside of the container clean at all times.
- Make sure to wash your hands after you touch the snail.





Trivia of snails

Snails defecate colored feces depending on the color of feed they eat. Observe their feces with your child and look it up in a reference book.

Taking care of a familiar animal at home will help children take an interest in living things.

It will also be a good opportunity for your child to learn about the importance of life through taking care of small creatures. You and your child will enjoy having chats about the snail, taking care of it and observing its growth together.

Minato Science Museum

The Minato Science Museum is a new museum that opened in June 2020. Taking full advantage of the many urban features that come together in Minato City, this museum provides everyone, from children to adults, with opportunities to learn about science based on the theme "Discover and explore the science that lives in the city."



The Minato Quest Map in the permanent exhibition area on the

1st floor provides various information on Minato City. Visitors can also enjoy hands-on exhibits that cover the different themes of City, Sea, Nature and Human.

On the 2nd floor is a planetarium hall equipped with a state-of-the-art optical projector and a 4K fulldome imaging system that displays 8 million stars. The planetarium screens original videos produced by the museum and features live commentary on the starry sky.



Children grow significantly in early childhood, physically and emotionally. They are still young but start to acquire the qualities that should be nurtured by the end of early childhood (refer to pages 8-9) in the period before they start elementary school. How do they show those qualities in their actual life at preschool?



Let's see how the 5-year-olds in January from the column on the left displayed the qualities that should be nurtured by the end of early childhood.

Connections to social life

As they wondered if there was a relationship between temperature and ice forming based on the weather forecast on TV, they started to check and record the temperature on the calendar at preschool, notice the changes in temperature, and inform the other children.

Budding thinking ability

Because of their interest in ice, they carried out many ice-making experiments with their peers. While doing so, they learned the properties of ice and further expanded their interest to places and containers where water freezes easily, as well as conditions for forming ice, such as temperature. They also learned to think from different perspectives while exchanging views with their peers and gaining exposure to different ways of thinking.

A relationship with nature/respect for life

The children had the opportunity to learn about the properties of ice by seeing and touching it first-hand and experiencing its coldness, wonder, and fun. This also helped cultivate curiosity and inquisitiveness as their desire to make ice generated an interest in conditions such as temperature.

Communication in words

Things related to ice became a common topic of the children's conversation. They expressed their questions, discoveries, and thoughts to one another with words, and the whole class shared information and learned.

As described above, children develop an inquiring mind and motivation to answer questions independently through the experience of working toward a solution, experimenting, and sharing thoughts with their peers during play and in their daily life. Experiences in early childhood help children acquire and understand knowledge backed by real experience as well as form the basis for children's lifestyle and studies at elementary school and beyond.
